



## THE USAGE OF FUTURE SIMPLE TENSE

**Abstract:** This article deal with the importance of future simple tense mistakes and this article is important in solving grammar mistakes in the future tense.

**Key words:** auxiliary verbs, affirmative sentences, negative sentences, predictions, offers.

**What is future simple?** Future simple with “will” is one way to talk about future events and plans. Future simple with “will” is one of the rare cases in English that need an auxiliary verb in affirmative sentences as well as negative sentences and questions.

S+ will+ verb

### **Will as an Auxiliary verb**

To form sentences in the future simple tense, the auxiliary verb “will” is required. This auxiliary verb serves as an indicator of future events. Whenever you see “will” as an auxiliary verb, it signifies that the sentence is referring to the future. It’s important to note that auxiliary verbs, including “will”, function as helping verbs, with the main verb coming after them in the sentence structure.

### **Future simple with Will : Structure**

In order to make affirmative sentences in the future simple tense, you need to place “will” before the **subject** at the beginning of the sentence, followed by the base form (infinitive without “to”) of the main verb. It’s important to note that the main verb



following “will” should remain in its simple form and should not take the third person “s” or “ing”. Look at the following example:

Nodira **will move** out of the dormitory by the end of the week

### **Future simple with Will: Negation**

Now that you know how to make affirmative sentences about the future, making negative sentences is easy. All you have to do is adding “not” to “will” and your sentence will become negative. See the example below:

Aziza **will not** go to the party next week.

### **Future simple with will: Questions**

We already talked about affirmative and negative sentences with “will” then, we discuss how you can make yes/no questions and wh-questions about the future. Yes/no questions in future simple are basically affirmative sentences with a different word order. To make these questions, you need “will” at the beginning to help you make the question, and the subject and main verb follow right after. For example:

Behzod **will help** Dior paint his house \_\_\_ **Will Behzod help** Dior paint his house?

They **will pass** the test \_\_\_ **Will they pass** the test?

### **Future simple with Will: USES**

You can use future simple with “will” for the following purposes:

1. Prediction
2. Promise & Offers
3. Spontaneous Decisions

#### **Prediction**

We often use the **Future simple tense** to make a **prediction** about future facts and for uncertain situations (I.e what we think will happen but we are not totally sure about it)

Look at the examples:



It **will snow** tomorrow.

We can use the future simple tense with “will” if we have a firm plan or decision when the main verb is “be”. Remember, we usually use other tenses or expressions to refer to a firm plan or decision in the future (such as Present continuous or to be going to ) unless the main verb is “be”. For example:

I **will be** in Turkey tomorrow.

**Will** you **be** at work tomorrow?

We use the simple future to talk about an opinion, hope , uncertainly or assumption regarding the future. Sometimes we only guess about things that will happen in the future, in the case, you use the simple future tense.

### **Promises & Offers**

We use the future simple tense to make an offer. In the case, it is mostly used in affirmative sentences. Here are the examples:

I **will help** you with your homework

We use the future simple tense with the pronouns “I” or “we” when there is “no” plan or decision to do something. We make the decision spontaneously while speaking. All the process of making the decision happens in a moment in this case. Here are the examples:

Don't worry, I **will help** you study for the math exam

We use **the future simple tense** in the **interrogative** form to make an **offer or request**. As you might know, interrogative mood indicates a question. When you want to make a **polite offer** you can use the “**simple future tense**” in a question. For example:

**Will** you **marry** me?

If you pay attention exceptions and special cases for the Future simple, It's definitely one of the easiest tenses to learn. You form it with the formula Will/shall +



infinitive form of the main verb. After that, you can express any intentions you wish with this handy verb tense! The future simple can help you talk about intentions, predictions and promises. Most learners struggle with tenses at the start, luckily future simple is among the easier ones to learn. In the reference, we will take a closer look at Future Simple in English and give you all the information you need to understand and use it correctly.
