Despite criticisms of Dragunkin's method for its lack of emphasis on pronunciation and theoretical knowledge, it remains popular among learners.

## 4. Petrov method



Dmitry Petrov's statement about learning English in 16 hours emphasizes acquiring fundamental knowledge rather than mastering the language at a national level. The author's lessons provide essential skills to navigate an English-speaking environment, articulate needs effectively, and comprehend responses.
