(Educators know warming-up activities are simple, but the main idea is to learn with funny activities and short games. The purpose is only training and taking a break from difficult lessons, in addition to encouraging students. The teacher's aim is to prepare them by stimulating learners' mindset or their bodies. If they play in a group, warm-up activities take at least 10 minutes. It is particularly useful for shifting their knowledge if used in a true way. Also, new students or trainees can get to know each other. Third is to force them to learn about a new topic.



There are other more compelling techniques for educators, for instance: Find someone Who., Circle games, Pass the sound, drawing games, Guess the picture, Memory game, Kim's game, and so on. But the Memory game is a more curious and great warm-up activity. This game requires illuminating memory and needs brief answers, and a clear explanation.

Recent research indicates that warming-up activities help students improve their knowledge and give them a memorable start to the lesson. For instance, Kristina Lim (ESL educator Lesson Warm-Up: Tips for Getting Students Ready to Learn (planbook.com)) claims that, "Warm-up activities help students shift their frame of mind into the subject they're about to learn. ESL educator Kristina Lim says warm-ups are important for a foreign language classroom because students may not have used that language at home or at all that day so far. It takes time and mental stimulation to start thinking about the world in another language, so a warm-up activity effectively supports this transition."

It is better to consider the point of Busy Teacher, as they said, "It's best to complete warm-up activities in the first five minutes of class," explains the team at Busy Teacher (Lesson Warm-Up: Tips for Getting Students Ready to Learn (planbook.com)). And this is the short explanation of this point: "Starting with a warmer is important for a number of reasons. Your students need a chance to settle down into the class and get their minds focused on the lesson ahead. Delving straight into difficult subject matter isn't going to help them in the least bit" (Why You Should Always Start with a Warmer (busyteacher.org)). As we see, there are many experienced teachers and researchers who make deep research about this project. However, one thing is important for all educators: why do they use warming-up activities? In my opinion, they must realize this for doing some warm-ups because education is not preparation for life; education is life itself (this opinion belongs to John Dewey).
